Responding to child and young person concern reports



Child and young person concern reports received from reporter agencies and how these reports were classified

A total of **101,803** child and young person concern reports were received in the July to September 2019 quarter. Of these concern reports reported in the quarter,

- **59.7%** met the risk of significant harm (ROSH) threshold,
- 31.7% were assessed as not meeting the ROSH threshhold, and
- 8.6% were classified as other.


What were the primary Helpline assessed issues reported from mandatory reporter agencies?

Assessment of child and young person concern reports to determine if they meet the statutory ROSH threshold


There were **60,785** ROSH reports in the July to September 2019 guarter. This is equivalent to an increase of **11.3%** from the previous quarter.



Compared with the same quarter last year of **50,508**, this represents a growth of 20.3%.

Of the 60,785 ROSH reports reported to the DCJ Child Protection Helpline in this quarter,




How many children and young people were involved in child and young person concern reports?

There were **55,979** children and young people involved in concern reports in the July to September 2019 quarter, an increase of **7.4%** from the previous quarter.



Compared with the same quarter last year of **50,055**, this is an increase of 11.8%.

Chart 5: **Children and young people** involved in **concern** reports






How many **children and young people** were involved in ROSH reports?

A total of **41,024** children and young people involved in ROSH reports in the July to September 2019 quarter. This represents a rise of **9.4%** from the previous quarter.

When compared with the same quarter in the previous year of **35,595**, this is an increase of 15.3% or 5,429 children and young people.

Chart 6: Children and young people involved in ROSH reports by Aboriginality






Child and young person **contacts** by mandatory reporters to the DCJ Child Protection Helpline

The DCJ Child Protection Helpline received 35,903 child and young person contacts in the July to September 2019 quarter. This represents an increase of **7.1%** or **2,380** contacts, when compared with the previous quarter. Compared with the same quarter last year of **30,614**, this is an increase of **17.3%** or **5,289** contacts.

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Keeping children and young people safe

Children and young people entering care during the quarter




A total of **557** children and young people entered OOHC⁷ in the July to September 2019 quarter. This represents a reduction of 4.9% or 29 children and young people, when compared with the previous quarter.

When compared with the same quarter last year of **537** children and young people entering care, this is an increase of 3.7% or 20 children and young people.

How many children and young people exited OOHC⁷ during the quarter?




There were **632** children and young people exiting OOHC⁷ in the July to September 2019 quarter. This is a decrease of **3.5%** or **23** children and young people from the previous quarter.

Compared with the same quarter last year of **582** children and young people exiting OOHC7, this is an increase of 8.6% or 50 children and young people.

Chart 2: Children and young people exiting OOHC⁷ by age at exit





There were **14,135** children and young people in statutory OOHC⁷ at 30 September 2019. Of these 14,135 children, 41.0% or 5,791 were Aboriginal children and young people.

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
Stable and nurturing environments for children and young people

Better placements and matching for children and young people in care

At 30 September 2019, there were **10,809** children and young people in OOHC with fewer than three placements.

This is equivalent to a decrease of **0.9%** or **98** children and young people from the end of the previous quarter.

Alternate permanent placement solutions for children and young people in need of care and protection


A total of **3,110** children and young people were on Guardianship Orders at 30 September 2019.


Chart 2: Number of children and young people on Guardianship
