

Chart 1: Child and young person concern reports






What were the primary Helpline assessed issues reported from mandatory reporter agencies?

Assessment of child and young person concern reports to determine if they meet the statutory ROSH threshold


There were **58,496** ROSH reports in the October to December 2019 guarter. This is equivalent to a decrease of **3.8%** from the previous quarter.



Compared with the same quarter last year of **50,190**, this represents a growth of 16.5%.

Of the 58,496 ROSH reports reported to the DCJ Child Protection Helpline in this quarter,




How many children and young people were involved in child and young person concern reports?

There were **54,328** children and young people involved in concern reports in the October to December 2019 quarter, a decrease of **2.9%** from the previous quarter.



Compared with the same quarter last year of **50,034**, this is an increase of 8.6%.







How many **children and young people** were involved in ROSH reports?


A total of **39,631** children and young people involved in ROSH reports in the October to December 2019 quarter. This translates to a decline of **3.4%** from the previous quarter.

When compared with the same quarter in the previous year of **35,268**, this is an increase of 12.4% or 4,363 children and young people.




Child and young person **contacts** by mandatory reporters to the DCJ Child Protection Helpline

The DCJ Child Protection Helpline received 34,963 child and young person contacts in the October to December 2019 quarter. This represents a decrease of 2.6% or 940 contacts, when compared with the previous quarter. Compared with the same quarter last year of **30,847**, this is an increase of **13.3%** or **4,116** contacts.

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Keeping children and young people safe

Children and young people entering care during the quarter




A total of **537** children and young people entered OOHC⁷ in the October to December 2019 quarter. This represents a reduction of 3.6% or 20 children and young people, when compared with the previous quarter.

When compared with the same quarter last year of **545** children and young people entering care, this is a decrease of **1.5%** or **8** children and young people.

How many children and young people exited OOHC⁷ during the quarter?




There were **776** children and young people exiting OOHC⁷ in the October to December 2019 quarter. This is an increase of 22.8% or 144 children and young people from the previous quarter.

Compared with the same quarter last year of 605 children and young people exiting OOHC7, this is an increase of 28.3% or 171 children and young people.

Chart 3: Children and young people in statutory OOHC⁷ by Aboriginality and placement provider at quarter end





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
Stable and nurturing environments for children and young people

Better placements and matching for children and young people in care

At 31 December 2019, there were **10,623** children and young people in OOHC with fewer than three placements.

This is equivalent to a decrease of **1.7%** or **186** children and young people from the end of the previous quarter.

Alternate permanent placement solutions for children and young people in need of care and protection

A total of **3,167** children and young people were on Guardianship Orders at 31 December 2019.

This is equivalent to an increase of **1.8%** or **57** children and young people from the end of the previous quarter.


Chart 2: Number of children and young people on Guardianship
