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Introduction

- NSW Government administrative data.




The majority of these sources are publicly available. We have provided source statements for each table and graph. This tells you where the data comes from and where you can find more information.

Demographic Data

Population - Northern Sydney




Figure 1. Population of Northern District, by LGA

The population in the Northern Sydney district was estimated at 850,385 in the 2016 Census. This district is made up of nine local government areas (LGAs). The largest LGA is Northern Beaches, with an estimated population of 252,878. The smallest LGA is Hunters Hill with an estimated population of 13,999 (see Figure 1).

The median age in New South Wales is 38 years of age. In the Northern Sydney district, Hunters Hill, Mosman and Ku-ring-gai had the oldest populations, with a median age of 43, 42 and 41 respectively. Northern Beaches and Hornsby both had an average age of 40. Willoughby and North Sydney both had an average age of 37. Ryde and Lane Cove were the youngest LGAs, both with an average age of 36.

Table 1 shows a breakdown of age for each LGA in the Northern Sydney district.

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander population

In the Northern Sydney district, 0.4% (n=3,251) of the population identify as Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander (see Table 2). The majority of these people are children and young people; 47% of the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander population in the Northern Sydney district are under 25 years old. This is higher than the NSW state average, where only 28.6% of the Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander population are under 25 years old.

Country of birth

In the Northern Sydney district, over 58.4% of residents were born in Australia (see Table 3). This is less than the New South Wales state average of 65.5%. The most common birthplaces, other than Australia, were China, England, India, South Africa and South Korea.

Languages spoken at home

In the Northern Sydney district, 67.9% of residents spoke only English at home (see Table 4). This is lower than the New South Wales state average of 68.5%.

The proportion of households where a non-English language was spoken at home was highest in Ryde (51.1%) and Willoughby (44.5%), compared to Mossman (18.6%) and Northern Beach (18.9%).

Migration Stream

15.8% of migrants who arrived in NSW between 1 January and 31 December settled in the Northern Sydney district (see Table 5). The largest number of migrants to the District settled in Ryde. Most of these people were skilled migrants (n=2,054). There were 138 humanitarian migrants in total. The majority of these migrants settled in Ryde, followed by the Northern Beaches, Hornsby and Willoughby.

Children and Young People

Government schools

The following tables provide information about the government schools in the eight LGAs that make up the Northern Sydney district. These tables provide information on the following factors:

No. of FTE enrolments	The number of full-time equivalent (FTE) enrolments indicates the number of students who attended the school over the course of the academic year. For example, 39.2 means 39 students were enrolled full time for one academic year and one student was enrolled for a fifth of the year.
% of ATSI	The percentage of FTE students enrolled who identify as Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander.
% of LBOTE	The percentage of students (headcount) who have a language background other than English (LBOTE). A student has a LBOTE if they, or their parents or guardians, speak a language other than English at home.
ISCEA value	The Index of Community Socio-Education Advantage (ICSEA) provides information about the socio-educational backgrounds of a school's students. This is worked out by looking at the parents' occupation and education, a school's geographical location, and the proportion of Indigenous students.
	The ICSEA is set at an average of 1000. The lower the ICSEA level, the lower the educational advantage of students who go to this school. The highest score of a public school in New South Wales is 1245, and the lowest score is 543.
% School attendance	The attendance rate is the number of actual FTE student days attended by full-time students in Years 1-10 in Semester One as a percentage of the total number of possible student-days attended in semester one.

There are 121 government schools in the Northern Sydney district (see Tables 6a-i):

- 33 in Hornsby
- 4 in Hunters Hill
- 20 in Ku-ring-gai
- 3 in Lane Cove
- 4 in Mosman
- 7 in North Sydney
- · 42 in the Northern Beaches
- 8 in Willoughby

The largest school is Killara High School in Ku-ring-gai LGA (1647.5 FTE enrolments, and the smallest is St Ives Park Public School (192 FTE enrolments), also in Ku-ring-gai.

The government school in the Northern Sydney district with the highest Indigenous population is Narrabeen High Sports High School (3%).

The government school with the highest LBOTE population is Eastwood Public School in Ryde (94%), followed by North Sydney Boys High School and North Sydney Girls High School in North Sydney (93%).

North Sydney Boys High School also has the highest ISCEA value (1219) and school attendance (97.5) followed by North Sydney Girls High School (1209 ISCEA and 97.5% school attendance).

Marsden High School in Ryde has the lowest ISCEA (1015) and lowest school attendance (91.3%).




Table 7 shows the Northern Sydney district has a smaller proportion of students who received short suspensions (four days or less) in 2018 compared to the NSW state average. In 2018, 0.9% of students received short suspensions in the Sydney district, compared to 4.0% in NSW. The proportion of students who received long suspensions (4-20 school days) was also less than the NSW state average; 0.4% in the district compared to 1.5% in the state.

In the Northern Sydney district, 6 students were expelled for misbehaviour and less than 5 students were expelled for unsatisfactory participation in 2018.

The Australian Early Development Census (AEDC) measures the early childhood development of children in Australia in their first year of full-time school. It measures this across five domains that predict later health, education and social outcomes:

- · physical health and wellbeing
- · social competence
- · emotional maturity
- language and cognitive skills (school-based)
- communication skills and general knowledge

The AEDC results can tell us if children are developmentally on track or if they need more support through their school years.

In the 2018 AEDC, the majority of children in the Northern Sydney district were developmentally 'on track' (see Figures 2-10). In all LGAs, over 67% of children were developmentally on track for each of the five AEDC domains




Figure 4. 2018 AEDC results for Ku-ring-gai LGA




Figure 5. 2018 AEDC results for Lane Cove LGA




Figure 6. 2018 AEDC results for Mosman LGA




Figure 7. 2018 AEDC results for North Sydney LGA





Figure 8. 2018 AEDC results for Northern Beaches11 LGA

Figure 9. 2018 AEDC results for Ryde LGA





Figure 10. 2018 AEDC results for Willoughby LGA



The AEDC also has two summary indicators that measure developmental vulnerability across all five domains.

In 2018, 6.0% of children were developmentally vulnerable on two or more domains in the Northern Sydney district (see Table 8). This is less than the NSW average of 9.6%. Mosman had the highest proportion of children who were developmentally vulnerable on two or more domains, at 7.7%. Hunters Hill had the smallest proportion at 3.3%.

Vulnerable children and young people

Using the Their Futures Matter (TFM) Human Services Dataset, TFM identified three vulnerable groups of children and young people in NSW:

For each vulnerable group, TFM identified five indicators associated with poor outcomes later in life. They also identified the proportion of this group with this indicator. TFM identified these indicators by undertaking predictive modelling and analysis, using the TFM Human Services Data set. This dataset brings together data collected by ten different government agencies. It includes data on child protection, housing, justice, health, education, and commonwealth service use.

Table 9 shows the top five indicators for each vulnerable group in the Northern Sydney district.

Table 10 shows the number and proportion of children in each of the vulnerable groups by LGA. It also shows us what proportion of this group identifies as Aboriginal.

For example, in Hunters Hill, 724 children were under the age of five. Of these children, 14% (n=102) were identified as vulnerable and 6% of these vulnerable children identified as Aboriginal. By comparison, in Northern Beaches, 20% of children under the age of five were vulnerable and 3% of these vulnerable children identified as Aboriginal.

When looking at children under the age of 15, 11% were affected by mental illness in Ryde, compared to 8% in Hunters Hill.

When looking at children and young people between the ages of 15 and 18, 13% were affected by mental illness in the North Sydney, compared to only 6% in Hunters Hill.

Contact with child protection services

In 2016-17, 0.2% (n=374) of children and young people aged 18 and under were in out-of-home care (OOHC) in the Northern Sydney district (see Table 11). The majority of these children and young people were in the Northern Beaches (n=144) and Hornsby (n=99) LGAs.

In 2016-17, 1.5% (n=3,032) of children and young people aged 18 and under were found to be at risk of significant harm (ROSH). The majority of these children were in the Northern Beaches (n=1,020).

Hunters Hill had the smallest number of children reported, reported at ROSH or in OOHC.

Economic Environment

Education

Of people aged 15 and over in the Northern Sydney district, 42.5% of people aged 15 and over reported having completed a Bachelor degree level and above as their highest level of educational attainment (see Table 12). This is much higher than the NSW state average of 23.4%. The next most common highest level of education for people aged 15 years and over was Year 12, at 16.2%.

Employment

There were 448,870 people who reported being in the labour force in the week before Census night in the Northern Sydney district. Of these, 62.2% were employed full time, 29.3% were employed part-time and 4.4% were unemployed (see Table 13).

The proportion of people who were unemployed was highest in Ryde (6.3%). This is, however, the same as the NSW state average. All other LGAs have a below average rate on unemployment

Income

The median weekly personal income for people aged 15 years and over in the Northern Sydney district was \$1,016 (see Table 14). This is much higher than the NSW state average of \$664. The lowest median weekly personal income was in Ryde, at \$738. This was, however, still more than the state average.

All of the LGAs in the Northern Sydney district had smaller proportions of households with less than \$650 gross weekly income, when compared to the NSW state average of 19.7% (see Table 15). Ryde had the largest proportion of low-income households, 16.9%.

Socio-economic advantage and disadvantage

The Socio-Economic Indexes for Areas (SEIFA) is a measure used to rank areas in Australia according to socio-economic advantage and disadvantage. It is based on information from the five-yearly Census of Population and Housing. The information presented below is based on the Index of Relative Socio-economic Advantage and Disadvantage (IRSAD). The IRSAD summarises information about the economic and social conditions of people and households within an area.

In the Northern Sydney district, Ku-ring-gai has the highest SEIFA score (1,166) and is ranked the highest (see Table 16). This means Ku-ring-gai is relatively advantaged compared to the other LGAs in the Northern Sydney district. Conversely, Ryde has the lowest SEIFA score (1088) and is ranked the lowest (see Table 16). This means Ryde is relatively disadvantaged compared to the other LGAs in the Northern Sydney district.

However when looking at NSW as a whole, all the LGAs in the Northern Sydney district are relatively advantaged. All LGAs, excluding Ryde, are in top 10% most advantaged localities. Ryde is in the top 20%.

Decile: All areas are ordered from the lowest to highest score, the lowest 10% of areas are given a decile number of 1 and so on, up to the highest 10% of areas which are given a number of 10. This means that areas are divided into 10 groups, depending on their score. Decile 1 is the most disadvantaged relative to other deciles.



Community safety and crime

In the Northern Sydney district, 1,283 domestic violence-related assaults and 1,546 non-domestic violence-related assaults occurred between January and December 2018. Domestic violence-related assault was most likely to occur in Ryde, with a rate of 204.0 per 100,000 people (see Table 17).

In the Northern Sydney district, cannabis related offences were the most common in all LGAs, except North Sydney. In North Sydney, the most common drug offence was possession and/or use of ecstasy, at a rate of 213.6 per 100,000 of the population.



When looking at the age of alleged offenders in the Northern Sydney district, the largest number of offences were committed by 10-17-year olds in Hornsby and Willoughby (see Figure 11). In Lane Cove, North Sydney and Ryde, the largest number of offences were committed by 20-29-year olds. In Hunters Hill the largest number of offences were committed by 30-39-year olds. In Ku-ring-gai, Mosman and Northern Beaches, the largest number of offences were committed by people 40 years and over.

Maternal Health

Teenage pregnancy

Teenage parenthood is associated with a number of adversities, including low socioeconomic status, educational under-achievement and drug abuse. In turn, young parenthood can act to further entrench some of these problems and perpetuate a cycle of disadvantage.

In 2018, only 13 mothers aged 19 and under gave birth in the Northern Sydney district (see Table 19). This accounts for 0.1% of all births in this district. This proportion is much lower than the NSW state average of 1.9%. The LGA of Hornsby had the highest proportion of young mothers aged 19 and under in 2018, however, it was only 0.4% (n=5) of births.




Smoking during pregnancy

Smoking during pregnancy is an important modifiable risk factor for low birth weight, pre-term birth, placental complications, and perinatal mortality.

Between 2015-2017, mothers in the Northern Sydney district were much less likely to smoke during pregnancy, when compared to the NSW state average (see Figure 12). The LGA with the highest proportion of mothers who smoked during their pregnancy was Hornsby, at 2%.

Australian Mothers Index

Since 2000, Save the Children has produced a Mother's Index showing where mothers do best and where they face the greatest hardships. This index compares countries worldwide, as well as Australian states and territories and LGAs.

The information in Table 20 is derived from the Local-level Mothers Index. Five indicators make up this index:

- maternal health the proportion of pregnant women with at least one antenatal visit in the first trimester
- children's wellbeing the proportion of children under 5 developmentally on track (measured by the AEDC)
- educational status the proportion of women completing Year 12 or above
- · economic status average household income
- relative socioeconomic disadvantage a measure of a mother's access to material and social resources and her ability to participate in society

These indicators were used to rank every LGA in NSW, where 1 is the best rank and 152 is the worst.

In the Northern Sydney district, all LGAs were ranked in the top 20 of the state (see Table 20). North Sydney received was ranked number 2. Ryde was ranked number 20. This means that mothers in Ryde are facing greater hardships than mothers in North Sydney. However, it should be noted that a rank of 20 out of 152, means that mothers in Ryde are facing less hardships than the majority of mothers in the rest of NSW.

Disability

Need for assistance with core activities

In the Northern Sydney district, 3.8% of the population need help or assistance with core activities (see Table 21). This amounts to 31,893 people. In the Hunters Hill LGA, 6.0% of people need help or assistance with core activities. This was the highest proportion of all nine LGAs. In the North Sydney LGA, 2.1% of people need help or assistance with core activities. This was the smallest proportion of all nine LGAs.

A person's need for help or assistance in one or more of the three core activity areas of self-care, mobility, and communication, because of a disability, long-term health condition (lasting six months or more) or old age.

Housing

Households

In the Northern Sydney district, the average number of people per household is 2.6, which is the same as the NSW state average. Hornsby LGA had the highest average in the district, at 2.9 and North Sydney had the lowest average, at 2 (see Table 22).

The majority of households in the Northern Sydney district are family households, at 73.9%. Single-person households make up 22.4% of all households. Only 3.7% of households in the district are group households. These proportions are similar to the NSW state average.

Tenure types

In the Northern Sydney district, 33.6% of occupied private dwellings were owned outright, 33.0% were owned with a mortgage and 30.0% were rented (see Table 23).

Ku-ring-gai had the highest proportion of private dwellings owned outright, at 42.1%. Ryde had the lowest proportion, at 29.3%.

North Sydney had the highest proportion of rented private dwellings at 50.8%. This is much higher than the NSW state average of 31.8%. Ku-ring-gai had the lowest proportion of rented private dwellings, at 17.5%.

Housing affordability

One way to measure housing stress is to calculate the percentage of households who spend more than 30% of their household income on rent or mortgage payments.

In the Northern Sydney district, the Northern Beaches and Willoughby had the highest proportion of households in rental stress, at 15.3% and 15.9% respectively. Lane Cove had the smallest proportion at 6.7%. Lane Cove (8.6%), Hornsby (8.4%) and Ryde (8.2%) all had the highest proportion of households in mortgage stress.

Social housing

As of 30 June 2018, there were 6,261 social housing residential dwellings in the Northern Sydney district (see Table 25). Public housing accounted for 79.2% of these dwellings and community housing accounted for 20.6%. The Ryde and Northern Beaches LGAs have the largest number of public housing dwellings.
