



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Child and young person **contacts** by mandatory reporters to the DCJ Child Protection Helpline

The DCJ Child Protection Helpline received 38,352 child and young person contacts in the January to March 2023 guarter. This represents an increase of 2.7% or 1,017 contacts, when compared with the previous quarter. Compared with the same quarter last year of 33,788, this is an increase of 13.5% or 4,564 contacts.



## Chart 5: Child and young person concern <u>contacts</u> by mandatory












A total of **8,437** children and young people involved in ROSH reports who were seen by a DCJ caseworker in NSW in the January to March 2023 guarter. This represents a rise of **3.1%** from the previous guarter.

When compared with the same quarter in the previous year of **9,392**, this is a decrease of **10.2%** or **955** children and young people.





# DCJ caseworker from the first day of the financial year to the end of the quarter?

A total of **22,269** children and young people involved in ROSH reports who were seen by a DCJ caseworker form July 2022 to March 2023.

When compared with the same period in the previous year of **25,072** children and young people, this is a decrease of **2,803** children and young people were seen by a DCJ caseworker.



What is the percentage of children and young people re-reported at ROSH within 12 months of case plan closure by the end of the guarter<sup>4</sup>?

By 31 March 2023, **35.0%** of children and young people were re-reported at ROSH within 12 months of case plan closure (Target 32.3% by June 2023).

### Chart 4: Children and young people involved in ROSH reports who were seen YTD





Chart 5: <u>Children and young people</u> re-reported within 12 months of case plan closure by the end of the quarter<sup>4</sup>

## Keeping children and young people safe

# Children and young people entering care during the quarter

A total of **524** children and young people entered OOHC in the January to March 2023 quarter. This represents a reduction of **1.5%** or **8** children and young people, when compared with the previous quarter.

When compared with the same quarter last year of **442** children and young people entering care, this is an increase of **18.6%** or **82** children and young people.

# How many children and young people exited OOHC during the quarter?

There were **700** children and young people exiting OOHC in the January to March 2023 quarter. This is an increase of **7.9%** or **51** children and young people from the previous quarter.

Compared with the same quarter last year of **644** children and young people exiting OOHC, this is an increase of **8.7%** or **56** children and young people.

## Children and young people in need of care and protection by case management responsibility

There were **12,758** children and young people in statutory OOHC at 31 March 2023. Of these 12,758 children, **45.1%** or **5,760** were Aboriginal children and young people.




## Chart 3: Children and young people in statutory OOHC<sup>4</sup> by Aboriginality and case management responsibility at quarter end


